ASLM SPECIAL CONVENTION ON DIAGNOSTICS

NOV 25 - 27, 2025 NAIROBI, KENYA



Background

Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) represents a growing global health threat that undermines decades of progress in controlling infectious diseases. In Africa, the challenge is exacerbated by limited diagnostic capacity, inadequate surveillance systems, and insufficient funding, which hinder timely detection and appropriate response to resistant infections.

The World Health Assembly (WHA) 2022 Declaration on Diagnostics and the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) 2024 Political Declaration on AMR underscore the critical role of diagnostics and surveillance in tackling AMR globally. These declarations call for increased investments, capacity building, and multi-sectoral collaboration.

The African Society for Laboratory Medicine (ASLM) stands at the forefront of strengthening laboratory systems across Africa. ASLM's initiatives, such as external quality assessment (EQA) programs, the AMR Knowledge Hub, the MAAP Store visualization platform, and workforce development through professional qualifications and fellowships, have been instrumental in advancing diagnostic services and AMR surveillance continent-wide.

In 2024, the African Union released its Landmark Report on AMR, articulating the continent's priorities and calling for accelerated action to safeguard health security. This Special Convention provides an opportunity to present this report to African stakeholders, align strategies, and mobilize resources toward achieving the goals set out in the political declarations.



Purpose

This three-day convention convenes policymakers, laboratory experts, industry partners, funders, health economists, and partner organizations to foster collaboration and drive impactful interventions in diagnostics and AMR surveillance.

The event aims to:



Strengthen the continental response to AMR through enhanced diagnostic and surveillance capacities.



Showcase ASLM's comprehensive portfolio of AMR tools and frameworks.



Facilitate dialogue on innovative and sustainable financing mechanisms, tailored to African contexts.



Mobilize the political and financial commitments necessary to implement national and regional AMR action plans effectively.

Objectives

• Strengthen Diagnostic Capacity:

Address gaps in diagnostic infrastructure, technology, and workforce to improve accuracy and timeliness of AMR detection across Africa.

Amplify African Voices and Priorities:

Present and disseminate the African Union Landmark Report on AMR to galvanize a unified continental response aligned with global mandates.

• Showcase ASLM's AMR Interventions:

Highlight flagship initiatives such as the EQA business plan ensuring quality assurance, the AMR Knowledge Hub fostering data sharing and collaboration, the MAAP Store for visualization and analytics, and professional development programs enhancing the laboratory workforce.

• Promote Sustainable Financing:

Analyze current financing landscapes, explore innovative health financing models (e.g., blended finance, public-private partnerships), and build a business case for scaling AMR surveillance sustainably.

Mobilize Commitments:

Engage governments, donors, and the private sector to pledge funds and political will towards achieving at least 60% of African countries with fully funded AMR plans by 2030, in line with the target of raising US\$100 million for catalytic investments.

Accelerate Access and Innovation:

Address barriers and opportunities across the AMR diagnostics ecosystem, from R&D and manufacturing to access, uptake, and sustainability.



Program Overview

Day 1: Global Commitments and African Priorities

 - i. The External Quality Assessment (EQA) Business Plan ensuring laboratory testing quality and reliability.

 - iii. The MAAP Store visualization tool for real-time AMR data analytics and surveillance.
 - iv. Workforce professional qualifications and fellowship programs strengthening laboratory expertise continent-wide.
- Presentation of the AMR Surveillance Blueprint: A step-by-step guidance document developed by ASLM for standardized data collection, management, and analysis of AMR, antimicrobial consumption, and use in Africa.
- **Presentation of Regional AMS Guideline:** ECSA-HC to showcase their regional stewardship guideline and implementation approaches,

Special guests visit displays from diagnostic companies, research institutions, and implementing partners demonstrating innovations and tools advancing AMR surveillance and diagnostics.

- An evidence-based, compelling business case for AMR surveillance investment, aligned with the Political Declaration's target to mobilize US\$100 million to catalyze funded AMR plans by 2030.
- Strategy for leveraging this business case to secure funding and build partnerships.



Invitation for Funding Pledges:

Funders, governments, and private sector actors invited to commit resources towards closing the AMR financing gap.

 across the entire ecosystem from R&D and manufacturing to availability, adoption, and long-term
 sustainability.
